You as the SBC Immunization officer will provide technical and operational support for the planning, implementation, and monitoring and evaluation of evidence-based SBC strategies that contribute to increasing demand for immunization services. You will ensure the full participation of government partners, communities, and civil society organizations to achieve concrete and sustainable results that will help increase children's immunity and protect them against vaccine-preventable diseases.

Key functions, accountabilities and related duties/tasks:

- Support the design and implementation of the Social and Behavioral Change (SBC) strategy and activities aimed at increasing demand utilization of vaccination services and Strengthening community engagement.
- Advocate, create network, and build Partnership to enhance vaccine in the country
- Innovation, knowledge management, and capacity building
- Generate and use research, data, and evidence to inform the design, implementation, and monitoring/evaluation of SBC activities to improve health program indicators in general and vaccination indicators in particular.

To qualify as an advocate for every child you will have...

Minimum requirements:

- **Education:** A university degree (bachelor's or higher) in social sciences, including sociology, anthropology, communication studies / communication for development, psychology and/or related field is required.
- **Work Experience:** A minimum of two years of professional experience in one or more of the following areas is required: social development programme planning, communication for development or social and behaviour change, public advocacy or another related area.
- **Skills:** Experience in partnership building, reporting, monitoring, evaluation are required.
- **Language Requirements:** Fluency in French is required.

Desirables:

- Language: Knowledge of another official UN language (Arabic, Chinese, English, Russian or Spanish) or a local language is an asset.
- Relevant UN experience and experience in international organization is considered as an asset.
- Relevant experience at country level, particularly in development, fragile settings and humanitarian contexts.

UNICEF does not hire candidates who are married to children (persons under 18). UNICEF has a zero-tolerance policy on conduct that is incompatible with the aims and objectives of the United Nations and UNICEF, including sexual exploitation and abuse, sexual harassment, abuse of authority and discrimination based on gender, nationality, age, race, sexual orientation, religious or ethnic background or disabilities. UNICEF is committed to promote the protection and safeguarding of all children. All selected candidates will, therefore, undergo rigorous reference and background checks, and will be expected to adhere to these standards and principles. Background checks will include the verification of academic credential(s) and employment history. Selected candidates may be required to provide additional information to conduct a background check, and selected candidates with disabilities may be requested to submit supporting documentation in relation to their disability confidentially.

UNICEF appointments are subject to medical clearance. Issuance of a visa by the host country of the duty station is required for IP positions and will be facilitated by UNICEF. Appointments may also be subject to inoculation (vaccination) requirements, including against SARS-CoV-2 (Covid). Should you be selected for a position with UNICEF, you either must be inoculated as required or receive a medical exemption from the relevant department of the UN. Otherwise, the selection will be canceled.

Remarks:

As per Article 101, paragraph 3, of the Charter of the United Nations, the paramount consideration in the employment of the staff is the necessity of securing the highest standards of efficiency, competence, and integrity.

UNICEF is committed to fostering an inclusive, representative, and welcoming workforce. For this position, eligible and suitable female candidates are encouraged to apply.

Government employees who are considered for employment with UNICEF are normally required to resign from their government positions before taking up an assignment with UNICEF. UNICEF reserves the right to withdraw an offer of appointment, without compensation, if a visa or medical clearance is not obtained, or necessary inoculation requirements are not met, within a reasonable period for any reason.

UNICEF does not charge a processing fee at any stage of its recruitment, selection, and hiring processes (i.e., application stage, interview stage, validation stage, or appointment and training). UNICEF will not ask for applicants' bank account information.

UNICEF staff members holding fixed-term, continuing, or permanent appointments who are considered to be on abolished post status may apply for this temporary position and, if selected with a start date before 31 December 2025, may take it up as a temporary assignment, in line with UNICEF guidance on separation due to the abolition of posts or staff reduction. They will retain their fixed-term entitlements but will not hold a lien to their abolished post. Visa residence requirements: i.e. UNICEF shall not facilitate the issuance of a visa and working authorization for candidates under consideration for positions at the national officer and general service category.

An internal candidate performing at the level of the post in the relevant functional area, or an internal/external candidate in the corresponding Talent Group, may be selected, if suitable for the post, without assessment of other candidates.
